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PASTOR'S REPORT

ASSOCIATE PASTOR'S REPORT

There are many Sunday mornings when I am in charge of leading the time of bringing our gifts and offerings. One of my favorite Psalms to quote during this time is the first verse of Psalm 24: "The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it." I paraphrase a little bit to make it more personal by saying, "and all of us who live in it." During this time of asking for some interior reflection, it seems important to me to be reminded again that we belong to God. And not only do we belong to God, but the earth and all that is in it belongs to God, too. Wow! Throughout this year at APC, I recognize again and again the importance of this sense of community...of knowing we belong to God.

As we expand this sense of belonging, we also consider being part of the Body of Christ where no one part of the body is more important than the other. 1 Corinthians says, "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many." So, not only do we belong to the Lord. We need and belong to one another.

What a gift to be a part of the community at APC that is willing to engage in life together, knowing that we belong to God and to one another. Here's an example of how this is lived out at APC. This year, we started Life Goes On, a group for women who are widows. I meet with them once a month over lunch and we discuss whatever is on their minds and hearts that day. Sometimes I bring a devotion or a question, but primarily they lead the conversation. These women

laugh and cry together and discuss the best fire blanket to keep in their kitchen (complete with links texted later) and how they manage to get a ladder to climb on even though their kids would die if they knew about it. The women who have been widows for decades help the ones whose husbands died this year with planning for holidays and anniversaries. They ask one another practical questions and existential ones. In short, they belong to one another. One's grief is the grief of all. One's joy is the joy of all.

Thanks be to God for this community of faith that practices celebrating the gift of belonging to God and that practices the work of belonging to one another.

CLERK OF SESSION

The 2024 Session included twenty-four elders and two installed pastors. Session serves as the council for the APC congregation, supporting the congregation as a community of faith, hope, love, and witness through its activities and the elders' leadership of APC committees. The Session's activities in 2024 included eleven Stated Meetings; four Called Meetings (meetings for a special purpose, such as receiving new members); one Annual Meeting of the Corporation and Congregation; one Congregational Meeting (for all APC members) and electing commissioners to four Stated Meetings of the Presbytery of Greater Atlanta.

DIACONATE REPORT

The Diaconate at APC leads in ministries of sympathy, care, compassion, service and witness. The primary concerns are for the sick, the grieving, the needy and the friendless. In 2024, we had 24 Deacons, including one youth Deacon. Andrew Bamford and Lindsey Bray served as Deacon Co-Moderators. Chuck Ghent was the Deacon representative on the Nominating Committee. Dr. Beverly Markham provides leadership and support to the Diaconate.

The work of the Diaconate is segmented into four care teams, each of which focuses on a specific area of service the Deacons deliver to the congregation and community:

- ---The Compassion and Care team consisted of seven Deacons and was led by Ann Bogda. The goal of the Companion Care team is to extend friendship and support to individuals in the church family who are in need or cannot regularly come to church. Members of the team are assigned home-bound members of APC. They made visits, took treats, sent cards, made phone calls, and delivered flowers.
- ---The Connection and Support team consisted of five Deacons and was led by Kate McChesney and then by Jeffrey Jackson. This team works to support the Open Arms Ministry and reaches out to make connections with the outside

support groups that use APC's facilities.

- ---The Service team consisted of five Deacons and was led by Vickie Hyde. Members of this care team organized and supported memorial services and receptions.
- ---The Witness and Outreach team consisted of seven Deacons and was led by Yvonne Chrimes and Meredith Haslam. This team sends cards for life events. They support families of APC who may be mourning a loss or celebrating an important event. Typical celebrations may include births, baptisms, confirmations, graduations, and weddings.

The Deacons met ten times in 2024. We do not meet in the months of June or December, and we meet jointly with the Session in November to welcome new Elders and Deacons.

The Eldercare Support Group that is part of the Open Arms Ministry and is led by Martha Frutchey, is flourishing as a support group for adults who are caring for a spouse or parent. In December, the church contracted with The Tulip Place to offer care for these adults in the room across from the Eldercare Support Group so that those attending the meeting can bring their loved one with them. This removes the barrier for many people of having to find care when they cannot leave their care receiver at home alone.

The Open Arms Special Needs ministry continues to grow in its outreach efforts. Towards the end of 2024, the Bowling Nights consistently had around 30 attendees. The program continues to seek ways to serve families who have a child with special needs.

Sunday School: In 2024 there were two Sunday school classes plus nursery offered in both spring and fall. Classes were divided by age group from preschool through 5th grade into two classes: K-2 (Pre-K option) and 3-5. We used the Whirl: Classroom curriculum. During summer, we used curriculum for one combined K-5 class, plus nursery. The summer curriculum was the same with added weekly journals. We utilized around 19 teachers throughout the school year with four teachers teaching each week. All Sunday school teachers and volunteers were approved by Session.

Youth/Child Safety Training (taught by the church staff online), and background checks were completed prior to the start of weekly Sunday school classes and again as needed. The training and background checks are required every three years, and the training is held several times a year to ensure compliance.

Kids in Worship: Children's Ministry, in coordination with Lionheart volunteers, provided worship bags that contained crafts and activities for children to use during worship services.

Worship and Sacraments Class: This was not held in 2024.

Nursery: The use of an outside agency for staffing continues to be successful. We continue to have 1-2 children in the nursery at the 9:30 am hour, and 3-5 during the 11:00 am hour.

Children's Choir: Children's Choir, led by Riley Schreer, met almost weekly in the children's choir room from 10:20-10:50am. The children's choir sang in worship multiple times throughout the year. Attendance varied with about five to seven children per week.

Cherub Choir: Cherub Choir is directed by Gillian Graeme. This is a preschool choir for children ages three - Kindergarten and is held from 10:20-10:50am. The Cherubs sang in worship multiple times throughout the year.

Vacation Bible School: We held VBS July 8-12. We limited the number of attendees to 100 and had 30-40 volunteers. Our theme was "Camp Firelight" from Cokesbury. Many families from the church and community attended.

Club 45/Club 543: This monthly youth group for children in 4th and 5th grades met during the school year and was well attended. In October, Club 45 was changed to Club 543 to include 3rd graders and increase numbers and participation. We had about 5-7 students participate with a variety of activities including Adventure Air, Pumpkin Painting, a Christmas party, and a service night serving dinner to Family Promise.

Advent Fair: On December 1, we partnered with Youth Ministry to hold an Advent Fair in Fellowship Hall from 4-6pm. Lots of fun was had with activities, crafts and desserts.

Easter Egg Hunt: Our annual Egg Hunt was held on Saturday, March 23, from 11am-1pm. The eggs were scattered across the side lawn and playground areas and the hunts were separated by age level.

Blessing of the Backpacks: Blessing of the Backpacks was held during the 9:30 and 11:00am services on August 4. Children and teachers were invited to come forward with their backpacks to receive backpack tags and goody bags.

The **Children's Sunday** service was held this year on October 20 and centered around the book, *Who is My Neighbor?* by Levine and Sasso. Children led the entire service and, for the message, acted out an entertaining play based on the Good Samaritan.

Children's Christmas Pageant: The Children's Christmas Pageant was held during the 9:30am service on December 8 with 25-30 children participating and 5-8 volunteers. Children's Choir and Cherub Choir sang together for this service.

Children's Christmas Eve Service: Our 3:30 pm family Christmas Eve service continues to be a popular choice for our young families. We had members read scripture which told the story of Christ's birth. Members ranged in age from children to young adult. Each year we have many visitors attending, including several from APC Dayschool. The Children's Choir sang. Flame-free candles were used during the candlelight song during this service. Afterward, families and children gathered in Fellowship Hall for cookies and cupcakes to celebrate the birth of Christ.

5th Grade Breakfast: We held a fifth-grade breakfast for students who are bridging from Children's Ministry to Youth Ministry. Special commemorative gifts were given to these children.

DAYSCHOOL

APC Dayschool finished the 2023-2024 calendar year with excitement and accomplishment. Among the highlights of the year was the successful completion of the school year for 196 students and their families. The school year culminated in an "End of Year Bash" and graduation for the PK4 and Transitional Kindergarten students.

Additional highlights include:

- Successful 2024-2025 registration in January using the school portal "Our School Hangout." Registration yielded record enrollment for the upcoming year. Registration filled 16 classes representing 194 students enrolled with several age group waitlists.
- Two successful weeks of summer camp took place during June, one the week of 6/3/24 and the other 6/17/24, with a total of 296 campers for both weeks.
- During the calendar year 10 teaching positions were filled.
- The Dayschool completed its fiscal year at the end of July, allowing for the benevolence contribution of \$85,000 to APC.
- During July, Wendy, Alison and Ellen met to finalize a Dayschool Loyalty Program. This program enables the Director to provide staff with a lump sum cash award payable in the first check of the contract year based upon length of service. (Beginning with 3 years of service.) The Dayschool Board unanimously approved this to be implemented for the 2024-2025 school year.
- The 2024-2025 school year saw a successful kickoff with 200 students, 37 teachers, and 3 administrative staff members.
- Numerous property improvements have been completed or are in process. These projects, paid for with Dayschool funds, are throughout the campus and benefit all who use APC facilities. These include:
 - --outdoor classroom (in process)
 - --replacement of several classroom Dutch doors
 - --installation of pavers and sod in the patio area
- The Dayschool parent community, PAC, is very well supported across age groups. Activities sponsored by PAC are held throughout the year and routinely very well attended.

The Dayschool at Alpharetta Presbyterian Church maintains its reputation as a standout of nurturing and academic excellence. It fosters a supportive Christian environment that positively impacts students and their families while upholding standards that soundly reflect the entire APC community.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

The Membership Committee of Alpharetta Presbyterian Church conducted many activities in 2024 focused on attracting, connecting, and nurturing members. Active in this committee were Elders Bob Cookson and Derek Scheidt, Pastoral Liaison Reverend Dr. Beverly Markham, and committee members Lee Porter, Sabine Genet, Margy Culver, Colin Rosenberger, Susan McBreairty, and Alyssa Darby. The work done by the committee falls into several areas summarized below:

New member attraction and connection

- A new visitor follow-up process was continued and improved with committee members calling frequent visitors to engage and make connections within APC; also, they are encouraged to attend new member classes and join APC.
- New member classes were conducted on 1/22, 4/28, 8/25, and 11/17
 - o These classes resulted in 25 new family units and their associated children
 - All new members are actively engaged with APC
- The committee showed appreciation to 2023 and 2024 new members with a Christmas Party at Ollie and Heather Wagner's home with over 50 people in attendance.
- Coffee, donuts, and church activity flyers were shared with Dayschool parents at carpool drop-off points two times during the year.
- The All Are Welcome banner was developed for display to indicate our church's acceptance of all people.

Congregation engagement and involvement

- In 2023, we began a process to identify and connect with members who have become less active over the past two years in an effort to reconnect them to worship and activities at APC. In 2024, this program was shortened to engage members who are less active after just one year.
- Perhaps most importantly for the combined 2023 and 2024 years, APC has experienced a net growth of 75 members bringing APC to its highest membership in 15 years (~4% annual growth).

Congregational service/nurturing

• Rainbow pins were placed in several places in our building to foster understanding that truly "All Are Welcome" here.

- A new process of engaging inactive members began with a letter sent by the committee Elders to those members that had not attended in over one year. Follow-up calls by committee members were then made in hopes of getting them to return to active membership (see above).
- Worked with Session and staff to continue to communicate clearly on the APC website and social media that our denomination and congregation accept all people to worship, lead, and be active in the work of the church

MISSION COMMITTEE

La Gonave Haiti Partners: APC sends continued financial support to pay teacher salaries on the island, allowing school to continue, thus a hot meal for the students. Our contributions do not ever pass through the mainland's corrupt banking system and go straight to La Gonave for Healthcare, Education, and Infrastructure. Continued terrible unrest has prevented most travel to the mainland, resulting in an increase in poverty, basic goods, fuel, kidnapping for ransom, and other problems arising from the unrest. APC will return to La Gonave once the violence and political unrest cease. Our sister community, Ticotelette, receives a portion of the funding needed for teachers' salaries from APC as the number one priority at this time. With our former US partner church unable to help carry the load and unfortunately having to step away from contributing, the APC contribution is the only funding received, outside of The LGHP's general education fund. It is vital that APC continue to support the people of La Gonave, and specifically Ticotelette, with prayers and funding. Contact Randy Schiltz for more information.

The Drake House: APC has supported TDH since 2006. This includes helping to maintain one of the apartment units and supporting the mother and children while they live in the unit. Support is given through mentoring as well as furnishing and supplying the unit as families transition through the unit. In 2024, two different families lived in our unit; one mother for about 120 days and the second mother and for a different 120 days. These women in particular each had two young children. They received housing, social services support, job coaching and financial skills training. Families were able to access the food pantry weekly. APC provided gift certificates and a gift basket at Christmas. Also, APC participates in Miss Mary's Ice Cream Crankin' as a fundraising sponsor. Walter Dean has been very involved with Miss Mary's and Christina Appen, Toni Raabe and Polly Hyatt are the advocates for the unit and check in frequently with the mother. We have tried and will continue to recruit other church members who would like to be involved in sponsoring and taking care of the unit.

Memorial Drive Ministries: APC continued to support MDM, with Dr. Beverly Markham on the Board. Welcome kits with essential personal items (e.g., toiletries, hygienic care) were gathered by Presbyterian Women, Youth and Children ministries. The kits were collected and provided to MDM in April. APC supported the first Bridge to Belonging event in October by paying the cost to print the 150 programs for the event. Dale Carter is our Mission Committee representative.

Family Promise: APC hosted three families per session across four sessions, from grandmothers to infants. APC, in addition to being an important FP partner, is a gathering point for the community coming together for common good, as Alpharetta Rotary, St. Thomas Aquinas, St. James Methodist, UUMAN, and the Young Men's Service League, along with APC members, cooked, slept, decorated, and did laundry during our host weeks. APC added security locks for sleeping rooms and provided incremental support for FP's summer programs through the congregation's support. Finally, APC's support extended beyond hosting, as contributions supported the broader Family Promise program, which touched over 4,000 individuals in 2024. For more information, contact Tom Gould.

Bashor Homeless Men's Shelter: APC assembled 150 sandwiches in February between the Sunday morning services and delivered the sandwiches for distribution at the shelter. Volunteer opportunities were provided to the congregation throughout the year. Sydney Schneider is our Mission Committee representative.

North Fulton Community Charities (Fiscal Year 2024): APC continues to give financially to NFCC so that it can continue to provide good services to the citizens of north Fulton County. The food pantry and the thrift shop both provide quality items at reduced pricing for people who really need the help. APC supported supply drives during the calendar year, including the warm coat drive and the Thanksgiving food program in October and November. APC hosted NFCC's Back to School Backpack Drive that provided fully stocked backpacks to over 1,000 school kids in our community. Also, the educational wing of NFCC continues to provide help to individuals in areas such as obtaining GED certification, financial planning courses, second language courses, income tax preparation assistance, etc. Kim Fulkerson is our Mission Committee representative.

The Place of Forsyth: APC continues to collect food items year-round for both NFCC and The Place of Forsyth. "Food for All" items are collected in bins in the Fellowship Hall and transported to these charities by volunteers. APC gathered donations for the Thanksgiving food drive & Holiday House and supported the Coat Drive in the Fall. Eva Wardrup is our Mission Committee representative.

Habitat Aid Initiative: HAI completed a donor trip to Kenya from Jun 28 to July 10, 2024, with 14 travelers who witnessed HAI's projects and programs in the region. APC shared financial support during 2024 which helped with the following projects described by HAI's founder Walter Dean: "We continue our support of the Munyanza Health Center with overhead funding for salaries and pharmaceuticals. In summer of 2025, we will travel to Kenya with 14 travelers, 2 of whom are doctors and who will be providing hands on assistance to the patients in addition to providing the funding for the construction of an operating ward and the necessary equipment for handling operation procedures. We continue to provide food security and school supplies for the orphans at Ekolomani Child rescue center. 2025 will bring construction of teacher housing at Khwisero Girl's Secondary School in addition to five additional water points. Our website has been updated in 2025 to highlight all the projects completed since inception of our organization (www.habitataid.org). We welcome all at APC who have an interest in participating in this mission initative."

Hurricane Relief: In September, APC collected donations of food, clothing and household items for Hurricane Helene relief in Georgia and North Carolina. The donations were collected at APC and through the Dayschool and driven to a staging point for distribution. Also, APC provided a donation to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) for hurricane relief.

The committee met monthly throughout the year to support church staff and fill vacancies as they emerged. Specifically in 2025, the committee is grateful to have accomplished the following:

- 1. Accepted the resignation of our Children's Director, Ashley Stevens, and conducted a search which resulted in the hiring of Katee Whitfield as our new director.
- 2. Worked with Music Ministry leaders to hire Gillian Graeme as our new Cherub Choir (ages 3-5) director.
- 3. Organized a reception to thank Daniel McKemey for his two years of service as Youth Director in response to his resignation.
- 4. Worked with Ministry Associate Dana AbuGhazaleh as she finished her ordination requirements and is in the process of becoming an Associate Pastor for APC in March of 2025.
- 5. Revised and updated the Youth Director job description and formed a search committee that is now looking for a new staff person to work with APC youth and their families.
- 6. Conducted annual performance reviews for all staff and assured the awarding of a cost-of-living increase and Christmas bonus to all staff.

This past year was an excellent year for APC Property. Our property has completely recovered from the 2023 "flood." The most significant 2024 accomplishment was the replacement of the roof over approximately a third of the facility. The roof replacement was completed for less than the planned and budgeted amount; does not leak; and there have been no reports of damage to car tires from discarded roofing nails. In addition to the new roof, parking lot potholes were patched, and the entire lot was re-striped providing several additional parking spaces. Property expenses slightly exceeded the budget (~1%) largely due to significantly higher electricity and natural gas prices. Our property finished 2024 in "excellent" condition.

We have enjoyed personnel stability in 2024 with diligence and fine work by Jason Brandt as Facility Manager and excellent support from Tim Chisolm and Tyler Moore.

The finalization of the agreement/purchase will occur in 2025.

Projects Moved to 2025

The APC Fire Alarm has worked well for just over 20 years and continues to function properly. That being said, it is rather old and it is now difficult to find parts necessary to maintain proper function. Full replacement and updating is now necessary but the upgrade has been postponed until 2025 to avoid additional capital expense in 2024.

While the APC elevator is safe and working properly, we are overdue for an inspection by the City of Alpharetta. While we have repeatedly asked, there is a severe lack of certified inspectors approved by the City to conduct the inspections. While the City knows this problem, there does not appear to be a resolution planned or scheduled. We will conduct the inspection whenever this is possible.

A subcommittee of the Property Committee has been established to evaluate and recommend the correct order of installation of LVT floors in many of the APC meeting rooms and halls. The subcommittee is expected to make a recommendation by Spring and LVT floors are expected to be phased in over the next several years.

APC is seriously considering the installation of solar panels for providing all or at least a significant part of our electric power. We expect to complete a feasibility study in 2025 and conduct a cost vs. benefit analysis prior to any work being authorized.

APC's Spiritual Growth Ministry offered a number of regularly scheduled classes and special events for participants to enhance their Christian growth through knowledge and understanding of the Bible and of issues of faith. We offer inperson meetings in classrooms, Zoom meetings and hybrid meetings throughout the week. For the 2024-2025 class year, we changed from the Disciple 1 curriculum to the Covenant Curriculum. We also changed the name of the small group to Bible 101. We have two offerings of this course.

Special Classes/Events in 2024:

- "The Hymns We Sing" (January 7, 14, 21) Charles D. Frost, president-elect of the Hymn Society of the US and Canada, provided a 3-part series on the history and purpose of hymns in modern worship. As one of the editors of "Glory to God", our Presbyterian Hymnal, he gave us great insight into how hymns are chosen and organized. He also led us in rousing renditions of old and new hymns. His first lecture was in person. Lectures 2 and 3 were via Zoom.
- Small Group Leader lunch. In July we held a lunch for all the small group leaders. We discussed each group's curriculum and history. We connected our groups through fellowship and delighted in each group's unique mission and vision.
- "Faith and Science" (August 11, 18, 25) Paul Wallace, professor of Astrophysics at Agnes Scott College, presented a 3-part in person series on the interconnectedness of Faith and Science. He taught from his book, "Love and Quasars," and shared how he sees God in the universe.

The stewardship committee was very active in 2024. The church ended favorably versus the established budget for the year. Although pledge receipts were less than expected, non-pledge receipts were much higher than expected. Combining pledge receipts and non-pledge receipts, the church saw the second highest revenue in the last seven years.

The endowment fund more than doubled. We moved endowment investment decisions to the stewardship committee, and approved use of an outside investment advisor for guidance. Investment income surpassed mortgage payments for the first time.

The church's financial review was completed and approved. We updated and approved the Dayschool interface. We approved a non-acceptance policy of restricted gifts. We approved a space use agreement with Lionheart. And we approved a contract with the Tulip Place to serve the elder care ministry.

We also approved the sale of a section of the property to the city, subject to certain conditions, for a new sidewalk with an easement condition and created a subcommittee to oversee the process and present it in the next congregational meeting for vote.

Commitment Campaign: Dedication Sunday was November 24 with the theme of "God's Generosity Our Gratitude How will you respond?" and scripture from 2 Corinthians 9:11, "You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity." Committee members were: Beth Hudson, Lynn Reiman, Tina and Steve Bostik, Bill Godshall, Pam Forcie, Laura Jackson, and Dale Carter. The team utilized the book, "God's Gift of Generosity, Gratitude Beyond Stewardship" by Karl B. Travis in developing the campaign. The 2024 pledge drive combined the previous brochure and pledge card into a single tri-fold document that decreased mailing cost by being able to use a standard envelope. Grocery tote bags with the APC logo were given as gifts. We received 203 pledges totaling \$964,950.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE

The Worship Committee of Alpharetta Presbyterian Church oversees all worship-related activities and functions of the church, including planning and implementation of these activities, and assists the pastoral and music leadership staff in these processes. These include core weekly worship services with scripture-based pastoral messages, participation in sacred music, communal prayer, as well as scheduled communion, and baptisms. Special worship activities such as weddings, funerals, and memorial services are overseen by the committee, as well as the planning and implementation of special seasons and times of worship, such as Lenten/Easter services and Advent/Christmas services. The committee is also responsible for other traditional elements of worship, such as liturgy, sanctuary preparation, acolyte functions, ushering, sound and lighting, flowers, and Memorial Garden planning and maintenance.

Following are some special highlights in which the committee and its membership have been involved in concert with other church members and leadership during 2024:

- The new EPIC (Experiential, highly Participatory, Image-rich and Connective) services began in 2024. EPIC is a casual service featuring praise music and interactive discussion. In 2024, we offered one EPIC service per month, typically on the fourth Sunday at 5:30pm with regular attendance 50+. Services were 45 minutes followed by food and fellowship. Communion was served at services nearest Easter and Christmas. During summer months, there was a focus on reaching out and connecting college students to the EPIC service.
- The church continues to livestream one service every Sunday, and there is a solid base of worshipers that enjoy the livestream service.
- Use of the screens in the sanctuary has been well received. Usage increased throughout the year to enhance the service with pictures or key words through the sermon and other parts of the service.
- Working on forming an Emergency Response team to report to Worship Committee. This team would hold optional sessions for emergency preparedness in sanctuary, CPR, and possible flu/vaccines. This team would also oversee updating of diabetic and first aid kits.
- Increased security presence during church services on Sundays in response to actions of neighboring churches and community.
- Lent was celebrated through February and March starting with Ash Wednesday's Drive-In morning ashes, children's pancake dinner, and evening service. Holy Week included Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday soup and bread meal and worship in Fellowship Hall, Good Friday noon service, and three Easter services 7am sunrise in the outdoor Prayer Chapel, 9:30am, and 11am in the sanctuary. Palm Sunday's service included palm fronds for the congregation and a cast of ACT1 actors and adults and children from the congregation reenacting Jesus' entry to Jerusalem organized by Children's Ministry.
- Gifts of Women service in March, Worship Committee/Flowers gave each woman a flower during services.
- Pentecost was a beautiful service emphasizing the gift of the Holy Spirit with colors, music, and handbells.

- Sacristy and usher closets were cleaned and organized. Better storage utilized for Christmas décor in coordination with Jason Brandt from Property.
- In October the church celebrated World Communion Sunday with Centro Familiar for the fourth year. The service was held indoors in the sanctuary including music from both congregations. Fellowship continued after the service with a shared lunch. The service and fellowship were well attended and should continue. Moving the service indoors was due to changes with A/V staffing, but it was well received and many thought it was more personal and communal.
- In November, APC hosted the Alpharetta Community Thanksgiving Service, an annual ecumenical service with leadership from several local churches/congregations. Great success and all enjoyed reception afterwards hosted by the Fellowship committee.
- The Advent season was beautiful and included the Children's Pageant, Christmas Music Service, and four services on Christmas Eve. The four services were a 3:30pm Children's Service with participation from APC Dayschool, two traditional candlelight services at 5pm and 7:30pm, and the final 11pm candlelight service with communion. All were well attended. The Longest Night service was held December 18 for a special time of reflection. Great organization and details for decorating and take down by Sanctuary Prep and Property.
